FAR WEST MASTERS SCHOLARSHIP PROFILE Morganne Murphy-Meyers By Sandy Hogan



Morganne Murphy-Meyers, a Jeff Wattenmaker scholarship recipient, is at Colby-Sawyer college. She skied for Squaw Valley, and was in our program for 4 years before going to college. Here's a letter from her, relating her recent experiences:

"I have finally reached my Senior year! This past year has been the most adventurous and fulfilling of my life. It began in July when I travelled to Australia for my semester abroad, where I made lifelong friends and discovered a new independence. I travelled extensively throughout the country, including, Sydney, Melbourne, and Cairns, as well as outside the country, to Bali and Fiji. I still talk to the friends I made on a regular basis and we are planning a reunion next summer."

"When I got back from Australia I headed straight to Colorado for a week of training with my ski team. I then went home for an entire month and skied powder at Mammoth and Squaw! I had the best powder days of the past four years and I hope this coming season can live up to it! I was extremely excited to start the collegiate racing tour at the beginning of January, but unfortunately, three days before my first race I tore my ACL again."

"I took this obstacle and turned it into an opportunity to take a more rigorous course load, so I could have an easier senior year. I had surgery in March under an incredible orthopedic team at Dartmouth head by Dr. James Ames. Since I had already used my patella as a graft for my ACL reconstruction in 2012, we opted to use a cadaver graft. The surgery was a success and I could walk within a week. My physical therapy has been going well and I cannot wait to return to snow over Thanksgiving!"

"I finished my semester strong with a 3.82 GPA and received an offer to work with my professor on his research project about migratory birds carrying West Nile virus and other pathogens by studying blood gorges within hippoboscid flies. I will be working with him later this year in New Jersey to setup bird nets and catch hawks, eagles, and other birds of prey. I am so excited!"

"I am currently volunteering in Belize where we are traveling to remote communities and setting up day health clinics. I am not only gaining medical experience, but I am also experiencing what it is like to live in poverty firsthand. We have met several families where they are living in a small house without necessities like soap, a flush toilet, or beds. Hardly anyone in the communities has completed schooling past grade 6. This experience has been eye-opening and it has made me realize how fortunate I am to live in an industrialized country, let alone be able to afford to travel the world and pursue my passion for skiing and becoming a doctor. This trip is also helping me solidify I have made the right career choice. Even though I cannot change these people's lives, it is rewarding and fulfilling I can at least help them become healthy again."

"Thank you for everything you have provided for me over the past four years and allowing me countless opportunities I would not have experienced without your assistance."

As usual Far West Masters were well represented with several top 3 finishers, as follows: Jodi Melton took 1st place in Class 6 and Linda Crowell took 3rd place in Class 8 despite a DNF in the last race due to a nasty crash. Best wishes to Linda for a speedy recovery. Gaetano Demattei took 1st in Class 13 and Ara Papazian was 1st in class 5. Don Merritt and Don Smith tied for 3rd in Class 11, Blair Wallace was 3rd in Class 9, and Mike Braun was 3rd in Class 7.
