Our races on Friday, March 14 (Northstar), and Friday, April 5 (Palisades) **do not require reservations at this time**.

Entry deadlines and cancellation info:

- The **entry deadline** for an event is generally set to be 1-2 days prior to the first race of the series.
- Online registration is closed at 8pm on the entry deadline date (this is usually on Wednesday or Thursday before the race series).
- The cancellation deadline is set at the same time as the entry deadline. You may cancel an entry at anytime until the cancellation deadline and no fees will be charged.
- The start list for a race is generally closed the day before the race, at the cutoff time determined by the ski area organizer's procedure.
- You must be on the start list to compete in the race. Day-of-race entries generally cannot be accepted.
- Open class participation must be elected before the start list is closed.
- Refunds may be granted at the discretion of the race organizer for injury or illness, but it is the competitor's responsibility to contact the race organizer prior to the race to notify them of your withdrawal. You can get the contact info by emailing membership@farwestmasters.org.
- No entry fees are charged if a race must be canceled.

Race Report: Alpine Meadows SL January 31, 2025

I had been looking forward to the Alpine Meadows SL for a while - after the challenging conditions at Sugar Bowl earlier in January, I hoped to feel a little more successful in SL for the two races scheduled for January 31st. This was my second Masters race back since a knee injury while free skiing in February, 2023 (Sugar Bowl was my first race back), and Alpine Meadows is one of my favorite mountains.

The morning started out overcast. As I took my first ride of the day on the Kangaroo chair at Alpine, I hoped the storm would hold off until the afternoon as reports said it might.

I hoped in vain. The wind picked up during inspection for the first run, and the first snowflakes appeared just about the time we started racing. The weather kept deteriorating from there.

However, we are a hardy group and we got the first run underway! (Well, we're somewhat hardy. At least, we knew we were hardy at the pizza party after the race. I think many folks were questioning their overall priorities and choices of race wear at the start as the wind blew through race suits.)

All of the racers in Far West Masters have always been so welcoming. I started racing as an adult, and I'm just starting to occasionally find confidence in slalom. As we lined up, all of the women chatted about the weather and the course (and our choices of race wear). It was fun to be part of this group watching from the start, and I cheered racers from the finish after the first run.

Run two proceeded much as the first, with intense weather and a challenging course that required a lot of effort from me. I felt great when I made it to the finish of both runs! Results of the race are here.

Many of us headed into the lodge to sit by the fire and wait for a decision about second race - we weren't sure if racing would continue that day. The visibility was decreasing, wind was increasing, and the snow felt wet and like it might be thick when it started to accumulate. The small army of ski area course workers worked hard to keep the snow off the course, but after inspection of the first run of race two the Jury ultimately decided to cancel the second race due to conditions. I think most

of us were happy with the decision. The light was flat and visibility was low by the time we headed to the pizza party.

Last season I watched many of the races from the finish, and I continue to be impressed by the skills of all of our racers. No matter the skill level, the mental battle seems to equalize the experience for many of us – beginning with the push out of the start, keeping our focus on the course, and then relaxing and having fun with the group in the finish. I'm thrilled to participate this season and be one of the hardy souls of Far West Masters.

Race report: Big Sky Masters Cup **Western Regionals** February 6-9, 2025

The Big Sky FIS Masters Cup and Western Regionals in a few words: Terrific racing, SG, GS and SL, cold with wind, international competitors from Japan, Canada, Switzerland, Germany, Austria, and France, expensive lodging, multiple delays, and did I mention cold.

The early week started with snow Monday and Tuesday for Lisa Dinsmore Ballard's camp attended by at least one Far West Master. Word was they had to do a lot of work preparing the hill but had a successful camp.

Thursday the Big Sky Ski Education Foundation (BSSEF), which hosted the event, put on two SG training runs. The course was on the race hill, well set with a good surface. Nice preparation for the day to follow. Always fun to get on long skinny skis that like to go fast.

Friday was scheduled for two SG races. We were greeted with four to six inches of new Rocky Mountain champaign powder that fell overnight. After spending the whole morning slipping the hill down to a hard racing surface, the race got off around 12:30 with women running first, groups D then C, followed by the men, groups B and A. The scheduled first race finished around 3 p.m. so the second race was cancelled. Did I mention standing around in the cold? The course held up well for all competitors. Our own Erik Nelson was second fastest overall, fastest in Group A, and the winner of class 3. Other podium finishes include Deb Lewis first Women class 10, Don Smith second men class 12, Dan Simmons first men class 11, Dave Anderson third Men class 11Vera Savage second women class 7, Brooke Wildenradt first women class 1

Saturday opened partly sunny and cold for two scheduled one run Giant Slaloms. Races started at the SG start and ran a little shorter. Both races got off, but with some timing delays. Another long day. Did I mention standing around in the cold. Courses were well set and the surface held up for everyone with lots of course work by BSSEF and competitors. Erik Nelson again was second overall in group A in both races and the winner of Men class 3 in both. Far West masters again stood on the podium in several classes, in Group B, Don Smith second in Men class 12 in both GS1 and 2,

Dan Simmons first Men class 11 GS1 and 2, Brock De Lappe third in Men class 11 GS1, Dave Anderson third in Men class 11 GS2, in Group C Vera Savage first Women class 7 in GS1 and 2, Brooke Wildenradt first Women class 1 in GS1 and 2; in Group D Deb Lewis first Women class 10 in GS1 and 2.

Race Report: National Downhill Championships, Soldier Mountain ID February 10-12, 2026

On February 10-12, forty ski racers from multiple divisions of USSA

converged on the small southern Idaho town of Fairfield. This is at the base of the Sawtooth range and about eight miles from Soldier Mountain ski area. The area has had quite a bit of snow and during our 3 days temperatures were subzero, adding a significant challenge.

Soldier Mountain has about 1400 feet of vertical spread over 1400 acres. It has few trees and multiple runs that lead to multiple options for downhill ski racing. They also do not have a race department at Soldier. Kids from Sun Valley do their speed training here on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday when the mountain is closed to the public. Setting up the racer venue with sixty rolls of B net and gates was done by the race officials and competitors. It gave us an idea of how hard it is to get a race set up.

Except for the cold, the weather was great. From the top of the mountain, vistas of the Camas plateau were spectacular. We had bright blue skies for all three days. The temperatures were subzero every day but luckily there was no wind and lots of sun. Morning temperatures in Fairfield ranged from minus four to minus twenty-three. Due to valley inversion, temperatures at the mountain were higher but on the last day my car registered minus eleven in the parking

lot upon arrival. For us Far Westerners this was cold. Dressing for the cold was a daily challenge.

Day one required all hands to help set up B netting on the upper half of the course. A hot lunch was provided by the lodge staff every day at noon. It was a chance to warm up and socialize with our fellow racers. The afternoon session was devoted to training.

Day two activities were to finish setting the course, adjusting some of the B netting and gates, lunch, and a training run.

Day three presented a major obstacle to racing. The upper lift was on mechanical hold as the cold temperatures had caused the hydraulic fluids to thicken and required heating to loosen things up. We were shuttled to the top in their back country snowcat and racing began. The first run had the fastest time of 1:45. A quick lunch and back up the now working upper chair. Run two had slightly faster times.

The netting and gates were borrowed from Sun Valley, and they needed them back to start setting up for the World Cup finals in March. After the second run everyone then headed back and started rolling and hauling netting and gates to the bottom. An awards ceremony followed this clean up and everyone headed for home about 5 PM tired but with big smiles.

This was a wonderful event. The race officials did a great job, and the mountain staff were friendly and immensely helpful. The mountain is small and harkens back to a time when many of us learned to ski. I plan to go to this race again and encourage all to try it.

Dear Far West Masters Scholarship Committee / Eddie,

First, thank you for all your support this season. It was invaluable. Also thank you for the opportunity to forerun and volunteer at the annual banquet. I really enjoyed forerunning and selling raffle tickets.

This season, I focused on my technique (movement between gates) and on my mental strength. I feel I had a great season with many highs and some lows including a back injury and some sickness. The accomplishments I am most proud of are as follows:

- Jackson Hole Super G series: 2nd, 4th and 5th
- 4th place overall for Far West (GS 2nd, Super G 2nd, 3nd and 6th)
- U16 Western Regionals: 3¹⁵ place slalom
- U16 Nationals: 13th place slalom (25th place first run, and 6th place second run)
- U16 Nationals: Super G training run: 5th (TPT coaches think I actually came in 2nd or 3rd but because not a scored race they did not DNF/DQ those kids in the posted results)
- U16 Nationals: Super G Although i DNFed i was feeling great, and i clocked the highest speed at 112.50 kph and had very fast intermediate results

In addition to my skling, I was diligent in my studies and currently have a 3.889 GPA and am hoping for a 4.0 for the spring semester.

I will be applying for the Far West Masters Scholarship for 2024-2025 and if accepted I would really like to attend the Copper camp in the fall. So hopefully, I could be considered for that.

Next season my goal is to train and race as much as possible to drop my points. The ultimate goal would be to race and be competitive on the FIS Elite circuit and in Norams.

New member info & how to sign up for racing (and renewals if you haven't yet!)

What do I need to do?

There are two steps to signing up to race with Far West Masters each season. Please review these instructions and make sure you complete both steps.

- Racing with Far West Masters requires BOTH a Far West Masters Membership and a US Ski & Snowboard Alpine Master membership
- Both memberships should be renewed if you plan to race with us in the 2024-2025 season
- Your FWM membership dues supports organizing our division race calendar and provides you with a permanent race bib for all our Far West masters races
- Are you a new racer with Far West Masters?
 Follow step one and step two, and Mary Feddis, our Membership Director, will contact you after you've signed up

Step One: Far West Masters Race Sign-up

We are once again using Admin Ski Racing (ASR) for membership and race fees. Far West Masters membership for 2024-2025 is now open at at masters.AdminSkiRacing.com/farwest.

Once you log in to masters.AdminSkiRacing.com/farwest:

- You will be asked to review (or create) your account for the season.
 - You may need to update your contact and credit card information
 - You will be able to proceed after you have completed this step
- Click on Event Signup in the left sidebar (remember, races aren't listed yet - registration will open in November)
- Select the 2024-2025 Far West Masters membership purchase
- Check out and submit payment

The Far West Masters page on ASR has detailed instructions to help you with the system. If you need additional assistance, you can contact Mary Feddis at membership@farwestmasters.org.

Step Two: US Ski & Snowboard Sign-Up

Renew your US Ski & Snowboard membership

- Registration instructions are on the US Ski & Snowboard website: https://usskiandsnowboard.org/membership/ registration-instructions
- Renew by October 15th to get the best price!

Reminders for US Ski & Snowboard Sign-Up

- Most masters should select the "Alpine Master" membership type. Only select the "Alpine Master w/ requirements" membership type if you are required to have SafeSport training and background checks due to your engagement with junior athletes through a US Ski & Snowboard club role.
- Most masters should select "No Club Affiliation" for the US Ski & Snowboard club affiliation. Do NOT select the club at the area where you ski and train unless you are actually a member - the clubs are generally associated only with junior alpine competitor programs.
- At the end of the renewal or new member process, you will be asked to e-sign a release of liability.
- Your Far West Masters membership is in addition to your US Ski & Snowboard Alpine Master membership. Your FWM membership dues supports organizing our division race calendar and provides you with a permanent race bib for all our Far West masters races.

Helmet & wax info

- A FIS-certified race helmet is required for all GS / SG / DH events
- A helmet is also required for SL, a face guard is recommended
- Fluoro race waxes are NOT ALLOWED in any events, USSA Masters and FIS Masters (ban instituted in 2021)
